LEARNING GOALS AND ITINERARY

The goal of this program is to introduce students to different forms of social movements in the United Kingdom and explore the role of ordinary people who rose up to make the UK are more just and equitable country. From the fight for religious freedoms during the Tudor Reign of Henry VIII to the Black Freedom Movement of the 1960s and beyond, this program will explore how ordinary citizens challenged the social and political norms of their time. Through examining art, museums, and literature this study abroad program directly supports the Montgomery College Academic Master Plan Initiative 6, Strategy 1: Expand opportunities for students, faculty, and staff to study abroad through exchanges, short and long-term programs, and service learning. This program will also explore themes of social justice via citizens' fights for freedom throughout different time periods in UK history.
