\* "First attempt" is the first attempt at Montgomery College.

\*\* In fall 1999 (200020) and subsequent terms, students with very minimal reading skills enrolled in "Pathways".

"Successful" is defined as a grade of "C" or better.

"Immediate retention rate" is the number and percentage of students returning in the following spring.

"Returned within 2 years" is the number and percentage of students taking any course at MC in the subsequent 2 years.

"Achieve threshold" is the number and percentage of students passing EN101 or its equivalent within 2 yrs of their first attempt in EN001.

"Academic Progress" is the number and percentage of students earning a GPA  $\geq$  2.0 for at least 15 credits. "Comprehensive" includes any work completed prior to their first attempt in EN001 up to the end of the spring term 3 academic years after this first attempt.

"Graduate w/in 3 years" is similar to the criteria used for the federal Graduation Rate Survey and Student Right to Know. These allow for 150% of the time to complete a degree.

"Graduate w/in 4 years" allows students an additional year to complete a degree or certificate.

Many of our students require more than the federal guideline of 150% of time to complete a degree.
