EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In fall 2008, student and credit hour enrollments increased 2.5% and 2.4% respectively. There were 24,452 students taking 223,461 credit hours. Since fall 2000, Montgomery College has experienced growth rates of 17% in student population and 26% in total credit hour enrollments, and has grown 13% in students and 18% in hours since Fall 2003. Montgomery College continues to enroll the largest number of credit students of any Maryland community college and is second only to UMCP in the number of undergraduates at Maryland higher education institutions.

All three campuses showed increases in the numbers of students and credit hour enrollments from last fall. Takoma Park/Silver Spring had the largest percentage increases. Distance Learning enrollments continued to increase as well – they were up some 15% from last fall.

Black, Asian, Hispanic, American Indian, and “Multi-Race” (a new category last year) students make up over 63% of the student body.

The number of younger students continues to increase; the average (mean) age dropped to 26.0 and 42% of the students are aged 20 or younger.

The number of male students increased proportionately more than females, and males now comprise 46% of all students.

More than one-third (38.5%) of the students are attending full-time (12 or more credits); average credit load is 9.14 hours – up from 8.94 just three years ago.

Fewer students – only 15% attend classes only in the evening, more than half (60%) attend only in the daytime, and 20% take both day and evening classes. About four percent of students were in Distance Learning courses only.

Nine of every ten students (89.0%) are Montgomery County residents; out-of-county (4.5%) increased slightly and out-of-state students increased slightly to 6.5%.

The College’s draw rate of June 2008 Montgomery County public high school graduates was 25.2 % – down slightly from 25.3% last year.

About 55% of the students are enrolled in Transfer programs (more than half of those students are in General Studies), about 18% are in Technical programs, and 26% have not indicated a program of study, or are not pursuing a degree or certificate.

There were 7,779 non-U.S. Citizens enrolled this fall, representing 179 individual “countries and areas of origin;” 963 of them were on foreign student (F-1) visas.

The number of students reporting some type of disability decreased by 46 students from last year to 1,066 students.
