Brief description of the project:

The group of faculty involved in the project of establishing Africana Studies program has submitted an NEH Grant proposal. But rather than allow for a break in the chain of activities, I would like us to continue engaging further in activities that will prepare us for the project when that grant is secured. The great need for global interdependence in this age; the vital position of Africa in this scheme; the immense diversity of African, African-American, Afro-Caribbean, and Afro-Latino/a cultures, traditions, and values, make it crucial that Montgomery College students are exposed to studies addressing the issues of Africa and the African Diaspora.

One or more notable scholars in the field of Africana Studies will be invited to hold a lecture/workshop for the interested faculty.
