Student Panel (Kimberly Jones, College Council Chair)

Which course modality best suits your learning style: face to face, synchronous remote, asynchronous distance learning? What type of student services do you prefer: in person or virtual.

- This student preferred synchronous remote courses better because it keeps me accountable, with specific due dates and because I am in a physical online class setting I am able to ask questions immediately when I have them, whereas an asynchronous setting I have had to email and wait to get a response to my questions, and it just delayed. For Student Services, I prefer in person, I feel like I can be more aware and more present, whereas in virtual setting I am not present.
- This student prefers face to face in-person because I am an outgoing person. I like to interact and be able to converse with other students. I am very excited to be back on campus. The experience is better than talking to people through a screen.

- This student prefers face to face because it is more engaging than any of the online classes. I am currently taking an in-person class and an asynchronous class and I am still doing bad on the computer classes. I don't find it engaging. I find it difficult for me to focus.
- This student is taking one synchronous course this semester. The student doesn't like it because I am not able to interact with the professors or students, and I think the most important part of any class you take is building a relationship with your professor. Face to face and synchronous remote allow you to do both. The zoom classes I have taken recently, because of the courses adjusted for a virtual online class, it is relatively easier and more paced. It is equal to what you find in a face to face, so I like both.
- This is an older WDCE student who is currently taking synchronous remote classes because of working a full-time job and also because of all the other responsibilities they have as a parent. This student likes the availability of doing the classes wherever you need. For example, in your car, if you're running late coming home from work, you are still able to participate and listen and not miss anything. It makes a difference when you are working and have a family. What I really like about attending MC is the instructors. They are very knowledgeable and it is cost effective. You get value for your money unlike other Colleges and Universities. When taking a synchronous course, you don't get to see some of the other students outside of the zoom setting. I think it would be helpful if you are a synchronous learner to create opportunities for people to maybe come in at the end of your course and have a meet and greet before you part ways to make a connection. It is helpful for the shy students who did not speak much during the zoom class to engage and it might be helpful to find more interest in the school and open them up for more engaging opportunities and would also help them connect with the community.
- This student is taking all synchronous remote classes. It is beneficial because I am able to multitask with volunteer opportunities in a lot of community engagement. I don't have to worry about transportation. Concerning student services, I do prefer to meet in-person because it is more meaningful. I find it difficult if you are having internet connection problems.
- This student currently is on their second year at Montgomery College. For the terms of the services the school offers, I prefer face to face support. For example, trying to connect with a counselor or any department you can be on the phone for hours and not get your questions answered. I feel if you are on campus you are able to get all of your concerns taken care of and not have to wait to get your question or concern answered.
- This student finds remote learning is a disadvantage. It is hard to connect with other students and build a relationship - also to communicate with your professor.

Tell us something you like about Montgomery College. How many of you have developed relationships with faculty or staff on campus?

- I'm an international student and I attend Howard Community College before I transferred here. I actually love absolutely love Montgomery College for so many reasons. First of all, the Student Life! As a student assistant, I feel like this is great for us as a student to be a part of Montgomery College. You engage with other people and meet new people. Be attentive to the clubs, participate

with all the activities, and also the workshops. I like it all. The workshops will help with my transfer resume essay and PTK -- it is really resourceful. The Shaw Center, because we students need help. When I attended Howard Community College, even though they are very friendly, they're very helpful with students, I didn't get my food and stuff free from Howard Community College. Here at Montgomery College I got a break, and I got food. Just so many resources from Montgomery College. I think for any Montgomery College student especially International students, when we have to pay more than regular students, that is why I really feel so blessed.

- This student said they have not had any good meaningful relationships with any of their professors. The professors really don't know you personally. I feel uncomfortable asking them for a recommendation letter. Currently, I'm a member of the student senate and my advisor is someone who I consistently communicate with I feel more comfortable asking for a recommendation letter from this person than from my professors.
- This student has had a nice experience with Montgomery College's staff and faculty. One of the professors has become my mentor. Also, I think Montgomery College is very friendly environment. Everyone greets you. I really appreciate how they make me feel. The connection I get from the staff, faculty is AWESOME. The student life activities, events the College hosts, I feel engaged with the community and I am grateful.
- This WDCE student has had nothing but positive experiences with both of the instructors in the project management certificate courses. My favorite part is how Montgomery College does a great job with connecting the students with professional opportunities.
- This student likes the fact that they are able to build a connection with their professors. I feel a lot of professors put in the effort to try to get to know their students and I feel it helps us to connect with our professors. They like the honesty of the professors. When they cannot answer your questions right away by your next class they are able to answer your concerns.
- Guidance and direction are most helpful. Understanding of all the courses/programs offered. They helped me apply and facilitate the connections I needed to reach my educational goals. This has helped feel confident with my major and transferring and continuing my education.

What could Montgomery College do to improve your academic and student experience?

- Resources for tutoring. I am part of the DSS. One problem I have experienced are the online classes -- they are hard for me because I lose focus. Montgomery College could offer more class selections for example STEM courses. The classes offered are not tailored to fit my schedule.
- Creating a buddy system within the class to help with not feeling like they are doing the class alone gives you a better understanding if you work with other students.
- If the professors could reach out to the students to make sure they understand and if they have questions. I think this will help the students better understand overall. More interaction for the students that are having difficulty with comprehending the discussion especially for the online courses.
- Ice breakers for students who are shy to feel more comfortable talking with one another.

- Identify with specific advisors for your major. Also, to create a list of students so they can reach out to them if they have questions or need assistance.

The Chair, Kimberly Jones thanked the students for participating in this student panel discussion. We have heard your concerns and your experiences, both good and bad. Montgomery College is here for all of our students. Our goal is to make your college experience great.
