EMPOWERING SUCCESS, DRIVING ECONOMIC GROWTH

Montgomery College fueled Montgomery County's economic engine in FY25—equipping students with the skills to thrive and helping businesses meet workforce demands. For every dollar invested in an MC education, students receive \$4.70 in lifetime earnings—a transformative return that empowers families and strengthens communities.

WalletHub ranked Montgomery College the best two-year college in Maryland and among the top 10 nationwide.

MC added \$1.4 billion to the county's economy in FY23 alone, according to the most recent economic impact by Lightcast, underscoring our role as a driver of job creation, business growth, and long-term prosperity.

EXPANDING ENROLLMENT AND OPPORTUNITY

- Served more than 46,000 students, including 2,732 graduates with 2,907 awards conferred.
- Summer 2025 enrollment climbed.*
- Spring 2025 enrollment increased 8%.
- Fall 2024 enrollment rose 6%.

MEETING WORKFORCE NEEDS DIRECTLY

- All Nurses ranked MC's nursing program 10th nationally.
- Secured \$4.15M Nurse Support Program grant— MC nursing's largest ever.
- Launched a new LPN program with 50 enrolled students.
- Expanded fully online programs to 41, advancing flexibility and access.

ACCELERATING HIGH SCHOOL SUCCESS

- Enabled a record 303 high school students to earn associate degrees.
- Increased dual enrollment by 27% over the previous year.
- Reached 75% dual enrollment participation by students of color.
- Dual-enrolled students maintained a 3.5 average GPA; more than half graduated with honors.



- Engaged nearly 700 employers through College visits, job boards, and career fairs—strengthening direct connections between industry and student.

Among the early transformative gifts: a \$1 million pledge from Patricia and Craig Ruppert to expand early childhood education and fund bilingual academic coaches—addressing critical workforce needs and expanding opportunity for future generations.







Recognizing Scholarship Excellence

Danae "Samantha" Flores-Tene and Rodin Ruiz were two of only 90 students nationwide to receive the prestigious Jack Kent Cooke Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship in FY25. Their achievements reflect the academic excellence, leadership, and support that define the Montgomery College experience.

Opening Doors to Careers

Internships at federal agencies and tech firms, like the new Hughes Network Systems facility at PIC MC, helped students build skills and confidence for their future careers.

Rodin Ruiz is one of 90 community college students nationwide selected this year to receive the prestigious Jack Kent Cooke Foundation Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship. The award provides up to \$55,000 per year in last-dollar funding to support pursuit of a bachelor's degree.

Ruiz immigrated from Honduras in 2019. He pursued honors literature courses through the Renaissance Scholars program and maintained a perfect GPA across 55 credits, supported by the Carlos Rosario and New Futures Scholarships. Ruiz is active in theater and produced an original play at the 2024 Capital Fringe Festival. He has presented his scholarship at the Maryland Collegiate Honors Council Conference, the Cherry Blossom Conference, and the Richard Macksey Symposium at Johns Hopkins University.

When Ruiz arrived in the United States, he did not know if he would be able to attend college. "Montgomery College taught me that higher education in the U.S. was possible, even as an immigrant building a new life," Ruiz said.

Ruiz hopes to teach at the college level and pass on his passion for storytelling.

MEETING PEOPLE WHERE THEY ARE

Montgomery College strengthened our role as a community connector in FY25—meeting residents where they are and offering programs that respond directly to individual and local needs. Through centers like the East County Education Center (ECEC), partnerships with K–12 and nonprofits, and new pipelines to careers, MC created meaningful, equitable access and support for all..

EXPANDING ACCESS THROUGH EAST COUNTY EDUCATION CENTER

- Served 1,500+ community members in ECEC's first full year.
- Hosted 50+ community events, including job fairs, workshops, and festivals.
- Delivered services in Spanish, Amharic, and French.
- Offered citizenship classes, tech training, ESL, and courses taught in Spanish.

LISTENING TO COMMUNITIES AND ACTING STRATEGICALLY

- Aligned credit and noncredit offerings with regional demand in areas such as criminal justice, cybersecurity, early childhood education, and small business development.
- Collaborated with Kaiser Permanente, regional chambers of commerce, and nonprofits to codesign curriculum and student support programs.
- Engaged more than 2,000 students, faculty, staff, alumni, and community partners in research to shape MC's new brand platform—grounding our identity in shared values and bold aspirations for student success.
- Launched a dedicated website to support displaced federal workers, and expanded MC's accelerated teaching certification program as part of Governor Wes Moore's Feds to Eds initiative.



ALIGNING CREDENTIALS WITH CAREERS

- Showcased Gudelsky Institute for Technical Education programs programs to construction and trades employers.
- Delivered IT training and coaching to 800+ underrepresented residents through TechMAP.
- Partnered with WorkSource Montgomery, Montgomery County Economic Development Corporation, Shapiro & Duncan, PCC Construction, and Associated Builders and Contractors of Metro Washington to align curriculum with industry needs.
- Engaged dozens of nonprofits including Future Link, Identity, Streetwise Partners, and the Nonprofit Alliance.

SCALING CAREER ADVISING PROGRAMS

- Trained and deployed 52 Montgomery County Career Advising Program (MoCoCAP) coaches in partnership with Montgomery County Public Schools (MCPS) and the Maryland State Department of Education.
- Registered MoCoCAP as a formal apprenticeship program.
- Reached 71,000+ MCPS students in grades 6–12 with career advising.
- Equipped our career advisors with 80 professional development hours to align students' personal goals with robust pathways for career readiness.

FOSTERING A COLLEGE-GOING CULTURE

- Collaborated with MCPS and WorkSource Montgomery to engage 5,500 eighth-grade students in World of Work (WOW) and MC Experience career exploration events.
- Partnered with Apple, MCPS, and Montgomery County Economic Development Corporation as part of the Montgomery Can Code initiative to teach 5,000+ middle school students Swift coding and app development since 2019.
- Welcomed hundreds of newly arrived immigrant students at our Newcomer Conference.
- Piloted a pre-dual enrollment bridge program at ECEC for multilingual learners.

ADVANCING CIVIC ENGAGEMENT THROUGH PARTICIPATION

- Hosted the Supreme Court of Maryland for live oral arguments attended by 450+ students.
- Installed ballot drop boxes and hosted voter registration events across our College through MC Votes.
- Led student-centered civic learning forums facilitated by faculty experts.
- Recognized in national and local media for fostering civic awareness and engagement among students.

Feds to Eds: A New Pathway to Teaching

Maryland Governor Wes Moore visited Montgomery College in May to celebrate the launch of an innovative program supporting displaced federal workers in transitioning to teaching careers. Backed by a \$100,000 Teacher Quality and Diversity Grant, the initiative expands MC's accelerated certification pathway-placing qualified professionals into high-demand teaching roles and addressing critical educator shortages across Maryland.



Fall Family Festival at ECEC

More than 800 East County residents attended the Family Festival, connecting with more than 20 community partners for resources ranging from health care to employment support. Bilingual outreach also helped students and families navigate academic planning and College services in Spanish, Amharic, and French.

Montgomery College quickly became Kumar's education destination because it offered biotechnology classes—her intended major—and affordable tuition.

Self-described as initially quiet and introverted as a new MC student, Kumar found that joining the Student Activities Board was a crucial step in helping her grow. There, she met new friends and was able to contribute ideas. She branched out further and met some of her closest friends through International Friends Club, a place where American and international students come together to showcase each other's cultures and create a welcoming environment.

Having graduated this past May from Montgomery College, Kumar will be attending the University of Maryland, where she is majoring in marketing.

Kumar credits Montgomery College's array of clubs and activities as one of the keys to her success. "To try new experiences, you have to come out of your comfort zone," she says. "Don't be afraid to try new things."

- Honored first-generation students during Community College Month with affirming events and resources.
- Opened new family friendly spaces and support services and hosted a Family Empowerment Resource Fair.
- Launched a national professional development curriculum with Ascend and Believe in Students to train faculty in supporting student parents.

EMBEDDING EQUITY IN COLLEGE CULTURE


- Deepened commitment to equity by transitioning the Office of Equity and Inclusion to the Office of Inclusive Excellence and Belonging (OIEB).

SHAPING THE FUTURE OF LEARNING

Faculty innovation and scholarship fueled bold progress across Montgomery College in FY25.

From pioneering STEM research and global learning experiences to transformative teaching practices and student-centered strategies, MC advanced academic excellence in powerful new ways. Supported by cutting-edge facilities, statewide collaboration, and technology-driven advising, the College prepared learners for a rapidly evolving future—while modeling what excellence looks like in and beyond the classroom.

ADVANCING INNOVATION, SCHOLARSHIP, AND STUDENT SUCCESS

- Secured a \$200K NSF grant for Professor David Torain's STEM education research.
- Opened the Leggett Math and Science Building on the Takoma Park/Silver Spring Campus with 20 advanced labs, a planetarium, and collaborative STEM spaces.
- Renovated the Takoma Park/Silver Spring Campus library with new technology access and family-friendly spaces.

EMPOWERING EDUCATORS AND ENHANCING INSTRUCTION

- Trained 36 new faculty through the Academy for Teaching Transformation.
- Engaged 135 faculty members in Al-focused professional development.
- Convened 200+ participants at the Inclusion by Design Summit to promote accessibility.



EXPANDING GLOBAL LEARNING AND LOCAL IMPACT

- Sent faculty to Senegal, India, and at sea with NOAA through federally funded seminars.
- Earned a Transform Mid-Atlantic award for MC Global Classrooms.

- Supported the transfer of 6,479 students to four-year institutions.
- Connected 2,100+ students with representatives from 54 institutions at annual transfer fairs.
- Launched a dual-admissions partnership with UMGC to simplify the bachelor's degree pathway.
- Signed a new articulation agreement with the University of Maine at Farmington.

ACCELERATING STUDENT COMPLETION AND MOMENTUM

- Completed 20,000+ welcome calls to improve onboarding and increase account activation.
- Launched the Starfish platform with 96% of new students activating degree plans.
- Awarded \$1,000 Raptor Ready scholarships to 651 students and achieved a 92% re-enrollment rate among Raptor Ready scholarship recipients.

Hundreds of students, faculty, elected officials, and community partners gathered to celebrate the grand opening of the new Catherine and Isiah Leggett Math and Science Building. The state-of-the-art facility represents MC's bold investment in STEM education, featuring 20 high-tech labs, a planetarium, a cybersecurity center, and spaces for collaboration and discovery. Innovation drove progress across the College in FY25—in instruction, infrastructure, and institutional leadership. MC leveraged cutting-edge facilities, global learning, statewide influence, and technology-driven student supports to strengthen academic excellence and prepare learners for a rapidly evolving future.
