Course Description:

Cultivating the communicative approach by learning ASL functions in interactive contexts. Methods of confirming and correcting information, asking for clarification, agreeing, declining or hedging and appropriate ways of getting and directing attention in various situations will be examined to frame effective communication in ASL.

Recommended to be taken concurrently with ASLP206. **PREREQUISITE(S)**: A grade of C or better in ASLP200 or equivalent, or consent of department. Three hours each week. Formerly SL210.

Objective Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course a student will be able to:

- Exhibit the appropriate usage of descriptive classifiers and signs in ASL.
- Demonstrate the competence in the language at an advanced level through expressive/receptive tests/skills, dialogues/discussions, questions and answer drills, demonstrating an 85% mastery of grammatical constructs and signing skills.
- Narrate a complete story using specified ASL structures including non-manual markers, contrastive structures, reference points, classifiers, retell a complete story in ASL.
- Initiate and sustain interpersonal conversation using the knowledge of the language and its issues and grammatical rules through expressive performance in class, class discussion, presentation, and examination.
- Demonstrate proficiency in ASL by achieving a 905 competency at the advanced level on the proficiency interview.
- Demonstrate knowledge of diverse cultures, including global and historical perspectives.
- Communicate effectively using listening, speaking, reading (receptive) and expressive skills using ASL.
- Demonstrate competence through tests, midterm and the final exam.



Grading Policy: The final grade will be determined as follows:

Participation / Attendance - 5%

Active participation in class contributes to your learning and is an important factor in your grade. There are three aspects regarded in your daily participation: your contribution to the class, use of ASL and presence. While your presence is extremely important, just being present is not enough! Your participation in this course is measured by your daily level of preparedness, engagement in the learning process, spontaneous volunteering, respect for others and for the culture you are studying, and use of ASL. By the same token, if you are not in class, you cannot learn; so attendance and punctuality are imperative as is being attentive and focused in class.

Absence and Tardiness Policy: Attendance is fundamental in a language class, and excessiveabsence/tardiness will affect the participation grade. Any student arriving after class has begun is tardy.Please indicate how you count tardies.You are responsible for all work assigned whether you are presentor absent.Please indicate your policy for students with excessive absences. Students may not fail a classbased on absence alone.

ASL Program: No-Voicing Policy: This is a no voice class. During class time you should keep your voice off and not whisper nor rely on "exaggerated mouthing." If other students <u>voice</u> to you, you should respond as if you couldn't hear them and ask them (by signing) to communicate with you by signing or fingerspelling. Review the participation rubrics to understand how your participation grade will be impacted by using spoken English in class.

PARTICIPATION RUBRICS	POINTS
The student participates with original ideas that show reflection on the material. The student comes to class prepared, takes the initiative in class activities, and shows a positive attitude. S/he is respectful with partners and teachers, offers help to partners and constantly seeks to improve her/his ASL skills. Only uses ASL in class	10%-9%
The student participates voluntarily; however, s/he does not stand out in any way	8%-7%
from other students in volume or quality of contributions, or does not show evidence	



of preparation Only uses ASL in class.	
The student attends class but studies/ participates the minimum required; She/he does not show interest in the class and only participates when asked or while doing group/pair work. Student voices sometimes.	6%-5%
The student does not participate because s/he is absent (mentally or physically) and does not develop rapport with the class. S/he is disrespectful or unenthusiastic. The student must be prodded to begin work, form groups, or participate. Student uses English excessively.	4%-0%

Expressive Quizzes: You will have 2 unit quizzes. These quizzes will consist of the following sections: *grammar, vocabulary, and topics for your expressive.* If you miss a test you will get a zero. The expressive portion of the unit quizzes will be done using GoReact in the lab in the Macklin Tower (Room 020) of the Writing Reading Language Center. There will be no make-up quizzes. Timely attendance is required for all quizzes. Tardy students receive zeros for the parts missed.

There are two parts to the expressive quizzes. In the first part you will demonstrate your expressive skills, and in the second part, you will have to watch the instructor's story and answer the questions asked.

Video Assignments: You will have 9 video assignments. The assignments are textbook based and consist of a series of production (expressive) videos that you will create after reading, watching and completing assignments. You will submit all your assignments using GoReact.

Deaf Events (Video Assignments): Students are required to attend at least two Deaf community events. The Deaf community events must consist of at least five Deaf people and last a minimum of 1.5 hours. If the Deaf event is not hosted by Deaf people, please check with your professor for approval before attending. No approval will be given for interpreted plays wherein the actors are using spoken English.

Students will need to provide verifiable proof of their attendance to the Deaf event. This proof can be in the form of a picture taken while at the event. Students will need to report on the event that they attended by creating a video clip in ASL that includes the information listed below. Please ensure that the information is not presented in a list format but rather in a way that would naturally flow like a normal conversation. The video must be submitted through GoReact. Assignments submitted within 24 hours after the deadline will receive a maximum of 50% of the original grade. Assignments submitted within one week of the deadline will earn a maximum of 50% of the full grade. Assignments submitted more than one week late will not be accepted for credit. The grading and posting guidelines will be posted in Blackboard. Students may redo assignments at any time as long as the original assignments <u>were</u> posted on time.



- Name of the Deaf community event
- When did the Deaf community event take place? What time?
- What was the purpose of the event?
- What kinds of people were in the audience?
- What kind of cultural behaviors did you notice that seemed appropriate or inappropriate? Give examples.
- What was the difference between attending a hearing event and a Deaf event? What was your first impression or feeling?
- What did you learn from the event? Any thoughts or feelings that you would like to share?

Critique of VLOGs: Students will watch, review and react to two video VLOGs focusing on Deaf related issues. Students can use the Internet to search for two VLOGs, which they will proceed to critique by creating a video detailing their summary and reaction to each VLOG using ASL. The video should be no longer than 2 minutes and should be uploaded through GoReact. All signed videos must be presented within the standard conventions of ASL grammatical structure. The video content will be graded according the rubrics provided.

Class Presentation: Students will plan a weekend trip for the whole class. The content should include activities, transportation and lodging designed for Deaf travelers. Class presentation is to be conducted in PowerPoint format in class and be limited to 10 minutes in which feedback/discussion is included. The presentation will be organized according to the rubrics provided.

Late and/or Make-up Policy for Coursework: Coursework is to be completed prior to the following session. There are no make-up quizzes or exams.
