Course Description:

HIND 101 is a beginning language course focusing on the study of Hindi language and Indian culture. Students begin to develop the ability to communicate in Hindi through the consideration of cultural themes, language functions, and authentic situations as they acquire the structures and lexicon to work with written language, conversation, and composition. No prior knowledge of Hindi is required. In-class work is supplemented by 20 hours of online homework. *Five hours each week. 5 semester hours.*

Course Outcomes: Upon completion, the student will be able to:

- 1. Communicate in the target language at an elementary level in the skill areas of reading, writing, speaking and listening.
- 2. Apply grammatical structures supporting communication at the elementary level of proficiency.
- 3. Express and appropriately employ language functions in speech and in writing, including greetings, leave-taking, requesting information, talking about self and family, asking for assistance, and giving and receiving directions.
- 4. Discuss Indian culture and cultural practices at the elementary level by using simple sentences.
- 5. Exhibit appropriate sociolinguistic behaviors through oral presentations at the elementary level as these correspond to increasing linguistic ability in Hindi.
- 6. Produce and present a cultural project at the elementary level.

Assignments:

Tests/ Quizzes: You will have 1 tests/ 3 quizzes during the semester. These tests will consist of the following sections: listening comprehension, grammar, vocabulary, reading, culture and writing. The dates of the tests are stated in the syllabus. The test will have 4 writing questions, focusing on grammar, vocabulary and reading and one simple extempore speaking section focusing on culture (This would make a base for final cultural presentation and oral exam). Quizzes will be in the form of multiple-choice questions, written or oral.

Midterm: You will have a midterm on the date stated in the syllabus. The midterm will be a comprehensive review of what you have learned to that point in the semester. It will consist of the following sections: listening comprehension, grammar, vocabulary, reading, culture and writing. The midterm may be rescheduled if warranted by special circumstances. First oral exam would be held the same day as of midterm.

Homework: Your homework is listed in the class schedule. All homework is due on the dates marked in your syllabus. Home assignments may change as the course progress. Teacher would confirm the assignments at the end of the class and it would be posted online for absentees. Since each exercise builds upon the previous one, all the exercises should be done in the given order. There will be reasonable flexibility in accepting the submission of the homework. It is expected from students to communicate with the teacher if they are unable to do home assignments in time.

Class Participation: Active participation in class contributes to your learning and is an important factor in your grade. The instructor will monitor student participation according to the following rubric:

Cultural Project: Students will complete a project that deals with an aspect of Indian culture. The presentation will be 3 minutes in length. The topic for the project must be approved by the professor. This project will require research; students will need to use reliable resources and provide a bibliography of their sources following MLA formatting. Students will present their work through the use of technology, such as PowerPoint or Prezi. No more than one 30 second video clip may be used. Students are responsible for presenting their work to the class on the day indicated in the syllabus. More detailed instructions will be provided by your instructor later in the semester.

Oral Exams: Students will complete two oral exams (one at midterm and one at the end of the course) requiring them to speak extemporaneously about a given topic. You will receive a list of topics and a rubric for evaluation two weeks prior to each exam.

Final Exam: A cumulative final exam will be given on the day scheduled during the exam period. The final exam is mandatory and cannot be rescheduled.
