In Review: The WGSP Summer Colloquium

The Women's & Gender Studies Program continued its tradition of a summer colloquium as 50 faculty, staff and students gathered on June 15 to share resources on the topic of *Radical Inclusion: Addressing Students' Needs in Challenging Times*. Dr. Donald Palmer, Professor of Psychology, opened the program with an overview of mental health concerns specific to young people. Ms. Gina Smallwood, the keynote speaker, presented mental health resources related to suicide prevention. Six faculty members discussed grass roots efforts at MC, such as food pantries and food baskets, the Safe Zone program, the [Global Nexus](#) program, the Bringing in the Bystander curriculum, and awareness of the challenges faced by women in STEM fields. Faculty News:

Lucinda Grinnell, PhD, Professor of English and Women's and Gender Studies:

This summer, Dr. Lucinda Grinnell participated in the National Endowment for the Humanities summer institute on "Suffrage Across the Americas" held at Carthage College in Wisconsin. Thirty professors from across the country participated in the institute, as well as approximately ten visiting faculty, experts in their subject field. Most of the visiting faculty traveled from Latin America, which was the most exciting aspect of the institute for Dr. Grinnell, as there are few opportunities in the U.S. for such transnational collaboration. She is currently writing an article on topics related to the institute and developing a primary source set for teaching about suffrage movements throughout the Americas.

Tara Tetrault, Professor of Anthropology and Women's Studies:

"I worked on researching the earliest African American landowners/Farmers/Businesses. A woman started one of the many towns I recorded on my database, so I hope to create an interpretive panel highlighting her accomplishment. I have also been working with the National Women's party Museum: I added Emma Turner, founder of Turnertown; Judge Sarah Hughes, who ran for President in 1952, and her campaign manager to the NWP historic trails inventory. They have offered to train a few of my students in artifact work. The last week of September, I will be putting up an exhibit in the Georgetown Public Library exploring the Archaeology of early Georgetown and the Georgetown landowners who planned Washington DC. I used the archaeological findings from the Francis Scott Key Site and Forrest-Marbury House to tell the story. Some students are using this for their project observations."
