Course Purpose

This introductory course explores the basics in literature, visual arts, dance, music, and drama through an exploration of representative works. It also focuses on the relationship of terms and concepts to the perceptual process and on developing both artistic and critical perception. Specifically this course will explore the role of the arts in a child's education, introduce explorative methods in arts integration, review past and current research and learning theories that support arts integration, and explore how the arts facilitate diversity in education.

This interdisciplinary studies course meets the integrated arts requirement of the Maryland Higher Education Commission approved A.A.T. (ARTD) Assessment levels: ENGL 101/101A, READ 120. 2.5 hours lecture and discussion each week.

ISTD 173 fulfills a General Education Program Arts Distribution requirement. This course provides multiple opportunities to develop the competencies of written and oral communication as well as critical analysis and reasoning, along with a proficiency in the arts and aesthetic awareness. Montgomery College's General Education Program is designed to ensure that students have the skills, knowledge and attitudes to carry them successfully through their work and personal lives.

Student Outcomes

By the end of this course, students will have:

Developed a global understanding and appreciation for the arts in general and their role in a child's development and education specifically;

Identified ways to integrate the arts effectively into classroom curricula, with an emphasis on multicultural awareness and active engagement;

Gained an understanding of Arts Integration philosophy and the research in support of its adoption;

Defined how arts integration can reach a variety of learning styles and intelligences;

Developed knowledge and resources for cultural arts in their community;

Discussed and applied how the arts can promote diversity in education;

Developed a basic knowledge of the concepts and terminology used in the visual arts, literature/poetry, music, theater and dance.

Attendance:

REQUIREMENTS FOR ASSIGNMENTS

Cultural Experience Reflection Paper:

Write a 1-1/2 to 2 page paper reflecting on a cultural event. Some examples are as follows: museum or gallery exhibit, concert, foreign film, cultural fair (Hispanic Heritage Festival). This paper <u>must</u> include vocabulary specific to the event from the <u>textbook</u>.

Presentations for Creating Meaning through Literature and the Arts:

Student groups will present one of the <u>Creating Meaning</u> chapters to the class using a creative format. Handouts for all classmates pointing out key chapter concepts are expected.

Art Collection:

You will develop a collection of art resources (starting with literature) based on a grade level and topic of your choice. The public library, internet, and textbook will be key resources. Parts of this project will be presented at various points in the semester.

Monologue Presentation:

Students will research a person in the arts and present a two- to three-minute monologue of that person. Students will dress and/or have at least one prop for their presentation.

Bulletin Board Group:

Groups will create a class bulletin board for a general classroom subject. The bulletin board should demonstrate excellent aesthetics, convey a general theme, arts integration concepts and utilize multiple intelligences. Group work, presentation, and the finished product will be graded.

Explore a Culture:

Choose one art form and create a piece that explores the arts of one culture. The art work - a song, dance, drama, poem/story, or visual art piece - should include all of the creative arts disciplines and other relevant information from daily life such as food, schools, religion and/or cultural celebrations.

Portfolio:

All class assignments will be kept in 3-ring binder portfolio. The portfolio must be neat and organized. The portfolio should be organized into three sections: Handouts, In Class projects and notes and Homework. The portfolio counts toward the final exam

Midterm and Final Exam: Both exams will be in an essay and short answer format.
