General Course Information: CRN 33351 3 Semester Hours Lecture

The course covers an introduction to the fields and research methods of psychology, including such topics as biological bases of behavior, human development, perception, learning, mental disorder, and social behavior.

Course Outcomes: Upon completion of the course, the student will be able to:

Demonstrate and understanding and apply concepts of learning theory, such as classical and operant conditioning, social learning theory to human behavior.

- Demonstrate and understanding and apply the concepts of the biological theory relating to communication and human behavior within the body; such as the neuron and neuronal communication, the nervous system, and genetic inheritance.
- Read, analyze, demonstrate an understanding, and think critically about research design, which
 includes the scientific method, differences between research methods, developing independent
 and dependent variables, statistical significance, and application of results to the population.

Required text: Psychology In Action Tenth Edition By: Karen Huffman

Course requirements:

Attendance, participation and questions [100 points]

Attendance, participation and developing questions will be an essential part of creating a successful class. As a result this assignment is mandatory.

Creating good questions

Each student will be in a group that will take turns reading the chapters closely enough to make **5 five** questions with answers based on the chapter(s) assigned. This will happen twice during the semester. These questions and answers will be used as a warm up for the class that covers the assigned chapter(s). LATE QUESTIONS ARE NOT AN OPTION as they can't be used in the class therefore no points will be given if not handed in on time. If you are unable to attend please e-mail David.Codner@montgomerycollege.edu the question and answers before 5pm on the day of the class so that they can be used. Please be aware that good questions may be used in either the midterm or final exam.

The 1000 points for this assignment will be awarded for the following: ONLY questions handed in on time or e-mailed – regular attendance – regular participation in class discussions.

ASSIGNMENT DESCRIPTIONS

Great Theorist Presentations [100 points] Because of the essential nature of the information on theorists and the creation of a One Page Handout for your fellow students this assignment is mandatory.

This assignment is a research presentation project focusing on the "Great Theorists" These theorists will be recurring characters as we explore psychology today. A clear working knowledge of their theories will be essential as we progress through the semester.

- **Each person** will pick at random a "Great Theorists" to research focusing on their *biographical* history, their *theories* and the current day *evaluation* of their contributions.
- **Each person** will be expected to make a presentation that should last at least 5 minutes. The presentations are **not limited** to lecture style so this is a good chance to be creative. ("A picture is worth a thousand words" having fun is even better!)
- **Each person** will need to prepare a **ONE 1 PAGE HANDOUT** due at the same time as the presentation, detailing the important *biographical* information about the person, a description of their *theories*, present day *evaluation* of their contributions to the field and a *bibliography*. **See appendix 1**

The 100 points for this assignment will be awarded for the following: Handed in on time - Presentation clarity / creativity, and detail, - Handout: biographical information, description of theory, current day evaluation of theory and bibliography

Observation One [40points]

This assignment is designed to you practice the skill of Observational Research with human subjects.

- Find a location that is likely to have a wide *variety* of people of different ages present. Library, Coffee Shop, Grocery Store, Food Court etc
- Make **discrete observations** focusing on the following

- 1. Interactions among the group of people being observed
- 2. Interactions between those being observed and the general public
- 3. Approximate ages giving observable clues for the estimates
- 4. Groupings, families, friends etc
- 5. Accommodations made for age, size, gender, physical conditions (Strollers, canes, scooters etc)
- 6. Dress, particularly if it conveys some meaning
- 7. An estimation of their emotional state, relaxed, happy excited, nervous etc

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- STOP the observation immediately and try again later if you or the subject(s) become uncomfortable in any way.
- After the observation is finished find a discrete place to record the information.
- Develop a way of displaying the gathered information in a summary form so that it can be handed in and reviewed for grading.

The **40 points** for this assignment will be awarded for the following: Handed in on time – The 7 discrete observations – A summary of the Observation

Observation Two [60 points]

This assignment is designed to connect theorists to your observation.

- Using the same location from observation one or a new one, make **discrete observations** focusing on the following
 - 1. Interactions among the group of people being observed
 - 2. Interactions between those being observed and the general public
 - 3. Approximate ages giving observable clues for the estimates
 - 4. Groupings, families, friends etc
 - 5. Accommodations made for age, size, gender, physical conditions (Strollers, canes, scooters etc)
 - 6. Dress, particularly if it conveys some meaning
 - 7. An estimation of their emotional state, relaxed, happy excited, nervous etc
- STOP the observation immediately and try again later if you or the subject(s) become uncomfortable in any way.
- After the observation is finished find a discrete place to record the information.
- Develop a way of displaying the gathered information in a summary form so that it can be handed in and reviewed for grading
- On a separate page discuss the observed behaviors as they relate to at least three of the Great Theorists work.

The **60 points** for this assignment will be awarded for the following: Handed in on time – The 7 discrete observations – A summary of the Observation – The use of the Great Theorists to further understand or interpret behaviors observed.

Video Reviews [100 points]

Please watch all 5 episodes of the Public Broadcasting Service Show "The Secret Life of the Brain" and for each video write out a one paragraph reflection, reaction to the content of the video. The videos will be in the Academic Success Center in the Commons Building and can also be found on the internet.

Essay responses: [100 points]

This assignment is to help develop critical, or individual thinking about information read and theories encountered as well as to encourage the art of writing, a skill that will be essential in further collegiate studies. There will be no correct or incorrect answers to this assignment so in this situation a bibliography is not required.

5 Five times during the semester from the assigned textbook Psychology in Action select a chapter and pick a personally interesting, surprising piece of information or theory to react to. Create a **1 one** page reflection on that topic. Be sure to include the chapter number and if relevant, the page number on your paper.

The 100 points for this assignment will be awarded for the following: Handed in on time -A clear personal response to material from the textbook -An effort to write a careful well reasoned paper

Make up research assignment: [100 points]

From the list below select **10 ten** terms, define the condition including any potential for harm to the person with them and briefly describe options for treatment if needed or possible.
