At Montgomery College and The Universities at Shady Grove, these are the students participating in our Achieving Collegiate Excellence and Success (ACES) program.

The Leggetts are well known in this community for their dedication to the empowerment of all. To celebrate this dedication, community members, friends, and family gathered on Sunday, September

23, for the Leggett Legacy Forward Celebration, held at the Music Center at Strathmore. The event highlighted the lasting impact the Leggetts have had on our community, and featured remarks by many notable leaders including Governor Larry Hogan; Senator Ben Cardin; Hans Riemer, president of the Montgomery County Council; and Sheryl Brissett Chapman, executive director of the National Center for Children and Families.

As many politicians do, lke wanted to party with a purpose. He requested that the celebration serve as a fundraiser, with the majority of the proceeds benefiting their newly established ACES scholarship, as well as other scholarships at Montgomery College and The Universities at Shady Grove. In total, more than \$1.6 million was raised to support scholarships that will allow students to pursue their associate's degree at Montgomery College and then transfer to the Universities at Shady Grove to complete their bachelor's degree. This overwhelming generosity will ensure that students will be given the education that leads to opportunity, and that the mission of the Leggetts will continue to positively impact the lives of Montgomery County residents for years to come.

This scholarship will not only provide for her education and wraparound services while she pursues her associate's degree at Montgomery College, but it will also follow Leandra to Towson University at The Universities at The Shady Grove Campus in Rockville, where she will pursue her bachelor's degree in elementary education. Foundation Board Recognizes Doug Firstenberg's Numerous Contributions

Doug Firstenberg is a man who likes to make a difference. Sometimes he's busy overseeing a project from his office in downtown Bethesda, where he's engaged in transforming the real-estate landscape across the metropolitan area. Sometimes he's walking a construction site, focused on bringing a concept to life. And, thankfully, sometimes he's talking to members of the Montgomery College Foundation Board of Directors, devising new ways to support our students. Regardless of where he is, Doug brings a vision of development—to a project, to a city, to a college.

Montgomery College is fortunate to have been on the receiving end of that vision. It began in 2004, when Doug joined the Foundation's Board of Directors, and continued when he was elected chair in 2007. Under his leadership, the Foundation funded more than \$65 million in construction projects. Doug was instrumental in bringing Holy Cross Health to MC, establishing the College as the only community college in the country to have a hospital on its grounds. Doug was also the chairman of the board when the \$25

Lifelong Learner Makes Impactful Gift

When Janet Crampton decided to make a gift of a lifetime to the Montgomery College Foundation, she made one with no restrictions. This kind of gift allows the foundation to direct funds to the College's areas of greatest need. Mrs. Crampton's practical approach to giving means a future for hundreds of students, and demonstrates a life of service to her community.

It all began in 1954 when she graduated from high school. She entered college not quite sure of her career path. Her parents said they would not pay for college unless she took courses that would lead to a job. She received a bachelor's in geology, a teaching certificate in math, and later a master's in geology. In those days, educated women were steered toward careers as teachers and nurses, but Janet took a different path.

Her enthusiasm for educating young people and her natural ability for organizing, analyzing, and writing led to many teaching jobs while traveling with her Army husband. Ultimately, she built a career as an editor and writer of scientific publications for non-profits and the federal government, including the Smithsonian's National Museum of Natural History. Ms. Crampton became the first geologist to volunteer as a docent in the Minerals department.



On September 21, friends, colleagues, faculty, and students gathered for the unveiling of the Janet Wert Crampton Geology Lab in the Science Center on the Rockville Campus. Margaret Latimer, vice president and provost of the Germantown Campus and Collegewide STEM Unit, lauded Mrs. Crampton for leading the way for other women to follow. "Thanks to pioneers like

We still have work to do, but we have come a long way because of the courage, passion, and the unquenchable curiosity of women like Janet Crampton." Mrs. Crampton summed up her decision to give to the Montgomery College Foundation: "I have had such a fortunate life. I want to give to an institution that is sufficiently large enough to handle such a gift. Just seems to make good sense to me."
