Frank Islam is the chairman and CEO of FI Investment Group LLC (FIIG), an investment firm he founded in 2007 after selling his information technology company, QSS Group, for \$300 million.

A noted philanthropist, entrepreneur, and author, Islam generously provided a grant to the Montgomery College Foundation to support the 2013–2014 Athenaeum Symposia.

He has authored two books, Renewing the American Dream and Working the Pivot Points: To Make America Work Again, which will be released in October. He is a regular contributor to the *Huffington* Post, Indian Express, Economics Times, and India Abroad. In addition, he hosts a TV show, "Washington Current Review," on MHz Networks. A well-known philanthropist, Islam and his wife founded the Frank Islam and Debbie Driesman Foundation in 2007 to support educational, cultural, and artistic causes worldwide. Mr. Islam serves on numerous boards, committees, and panels, including those of educational institutions, such as the University of Maryland's Robert H. Smith School of Business; American University; University of Technology, Malaysia; George Mason University School of Management; and Johns Hopkins University School of Advanced International Studies. He also serves on the International Advisory Council of the United States Institute for Peace (USIP); the Department of Commerce Industry Trade Advisory Committee; and the Maryland Governor's International Advisory Committee. 




SHEILA KAY ADAMS

Sheila Kay Adams, one of nine individuals to receive the 2013 National Heritage Fellowship from the National Endowment for the Arts, will demonstrate her signature drop-thumb style claw-hammer skills on the five-string banjo, her Appalachian storytelling, and ballad singing for an unforgettable evening of North Carolina folk traditions.

A seventh-generation ballad singer, storyteller, and musician, Sheila Kay Adams was born and raised in Madison County, North Carolina, an area renowned for its unbroken tradition of unaccompanied singing dating back to the early Scots and English settlers of the mid-17th century. She made musical appearances in the 1992 film *Last of the Mohicans* and was technical advisor and singing coach for the movie *Songcatcher*. She is also the acclaimed author of two books: *Come Go HomeWith Me*, a collection of short stories drawn from life in Madison County, and *My Old True Love*, a novel of love and family in the Civil-War era of Madison County.

Noor is a two-act play about the abduction of a young woman named Noor and her three brothers who represent currents inside modern Muslim communities: a Sufi, a secular government bureaucrat, and an angry fundamentalist. Noor was written by Dr. Akbar Ahmed, chair of Islamic Studies at American University, Senior Fellow at the Brookings Institute, and First Distinguished Chair of Middle East and Islamic Studies at the U.S. Naval Academy. He has taught at Princeton, Harvard, and Cambridge Universities and has been called "the world's leading authority on contemporary Islam."

Author of over a dozen award-winning books, he recently completed *The Thistle and the Drone: How America's War on Terror Became a Global War on Tribal Islam.*

Charles Williams made his opera debut at the Festival of Two Worlds in Spoleto, Italy. He has acted and sung in theatres and opera houses in Munich, Berlin, Hamburg, Zurich, and Vienna. He has also performed at Carnegie Hall, The Barns at Wolf Trap, The Smithsonian, and the Kennedy Center. He toured Europe as a cast member and vocal coach of The Temptation of St. Anthony, which was performed at the Paris Opera and at festivals in Melbourne and Warsaw. In March, Charles will end a two-year world tour performing in the ground-breaking opera Einstein on the Beach composed by Philip Glass and directed by Robert Wilson.
