Faculty-Driven Student Success HUB Goes Live!

Over the course of the last year, faculty have developed strategies/microinterventions to improve Program Student Success and DFW Reduction Initiatives, all with the goal of meeting MC2020 success targets: increased enrollment, graduation rates and transfer rates, and decreased time and cost to degree. A microintervention is a "brief, focused, high-impact exchange between students and faculty and staff members that fuels student success."

ELITE organized workshops on microinterventions providing opportunities for faculty and staff to discuss the teaching and learning process and share ideas of what has worked for them, as well as thinking together about the learning challenges presented by our students. Discussions started with a conversation about what might make a microintervention effective, and how might it make the student more successful, before moving on to what conditions enable students to learn most effectively and what faculty can do to create these conditions in the classroom.

Faculty used many such microinterventions last year, including outreach to students early in the semester or even prior to starting classes, providing timely referrals to learning centers, and employing learning focused exam reviews. The HUB is a blog that discusses various learning

concepts and shares microinterventions that may be applicable to your classroom.

As you progress throughout the academic year, please visit the HUB, not just to read about what your fellow faculty are doing in their classrooms, but to share what you are doing in your classroom to help your students meet our high academic standards. Your efforts may help a fellow faculty member as well as their students. You will also have the opportunity to participate in microintervention student success workshops throughout the year. MCOPEN

The Office of E-Learning, Innovation and Teaching Excellence (ELITE) has launched MC Open, an initiative that focuses on faculty redesigning courses using Open Educational Resources (OER) to leverage pedagogy that fosters student success while reducing costs and increasing access to course materials.

Approximately 100 sections of MC courses this Fall semester are being taught as a Z-course, meaning there is zero textbook course.

The MC Open initiative aims to:

1. Promote student success by encouraging faculty to redesign courses using OER and pedagogy that engage, connect and support student learning.
2. Make education more affordable by reducing or eliminating required costs for course materials.
3. Decrease time to degree completion by giving students the option of applying money toward an additional course rather than to books or other required course materials and by providing clear paths to degree completion.

Montgomery College was the recipient of a \$100,000 grant from Achieving the Dream to offer at least one section in selected General Studies pathways using OER. In addition, the College is part of a research study to examine how OER impacts learning outcomes.

Academic Affairs is also working with Criminal Justice and Business faculty to offer at least one section of the courses in those degree paths as a Z-course. Thanks to Follett for supporting those efforts.
