## **Achieving Your Teaching Goals Through Action Research**

Action research is "a disciplined process of inquiry conducted by and for those taking the action" (The Institute for the Study of Inquiry in Education). In this workshop series, participants will identify a pedagogical goal and implement an action research plan (ARP) to enhance student success. As part of ARP creation, participants will explore the benefits and challenges of using data analysis in action research as a consistent part of their instruction. Participants will apply relevant, current data to their work and will develop procedures for enhancing their own data collection for ongoing action research.

In addition, according to educational research such methods especially benefit the learning process of culturally diverse and underrepresented students. Teaching using collaborative and active techniques not only provides the setting for all students to become academically successful, in our diverse classrooms working collaboratively allows students to practice effective functioning in a multicultural and global world (Barkley, 2014). This program is designed for faculty in all disciplines who are interested in refining their teaching and improving the quality of student learning.
