

About Our Panelists



Carrie Fitzgerald has taught astronomy and physics at MC since 2009. She also serves as the director of The Montgomery College Astronomical Observatory located on the Rockville campus. She holds a BS in physics from Stetson University, an MS in observational astronomy and a PhD in nuclear astrophysics from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. She is an enthusiastic educator of all things astronomy, and as a NASA Solar System Ambassador, Carrie gives public lectures, workshops, and observing opportunities throughout the DMV.



Ellen Olmstead has taught at state universities, HBCUs, Ivy League colleges, urban high schools, TRIO programs, Upward Bound programs, multi-service community centers, and prisons for more than 22 years.

However, her primary commitment has been teaching at community colleges because they often serve a diverse community and first-generation students who are seeking a postsecondary education. She believes that educational opportunities are integral to social change.



Debra Poese has been a faculty member at Montgomery College since 1984. Beginning as a mathematics professor, she also served as the Chair of the Department of Mathematics, Interim Instructional Dean for Science, Engineering and Mathematics, and Director of the School of Education. In the fall of 2023, she returned to the classroom full time to teach math and advise students. While she has taught a wide range of math courses, she particularly enjoys teaching future teachers how to communicate math without fear. She holds degrees in Mathematics and Education from Truman State University as well as an MA in Mathematics from the University of Maryland-College Park.



Gregory Sember is an Associate Professor. He completed his undergraduate studies at East Carolina University with a focus on American politics and U.S. history. He has taught Political Science for seven years with experiences in Wyoming, Pennsylvania, North Carolina, and Maryland. His political experiences include working in two state capitals, lobbying, and volunteering with several interest groups. He generally teaches American Government and Introduction to Political Science.



Racquel Francis is a part-time ESOL instructor in the Adult Education and Literacy Grant (AELG) Program, Refugee Training Program, and EARN MIBEST Early Childhood Education Program. She has taught ESOL for more than a decade in the D.C. area and in Colombia through two Fulbright Fellowships. Additionally, she has written multiple curriculum frameworks, led professional learning communities, served on conference planning committees, and facilitated English teaching workshops.
