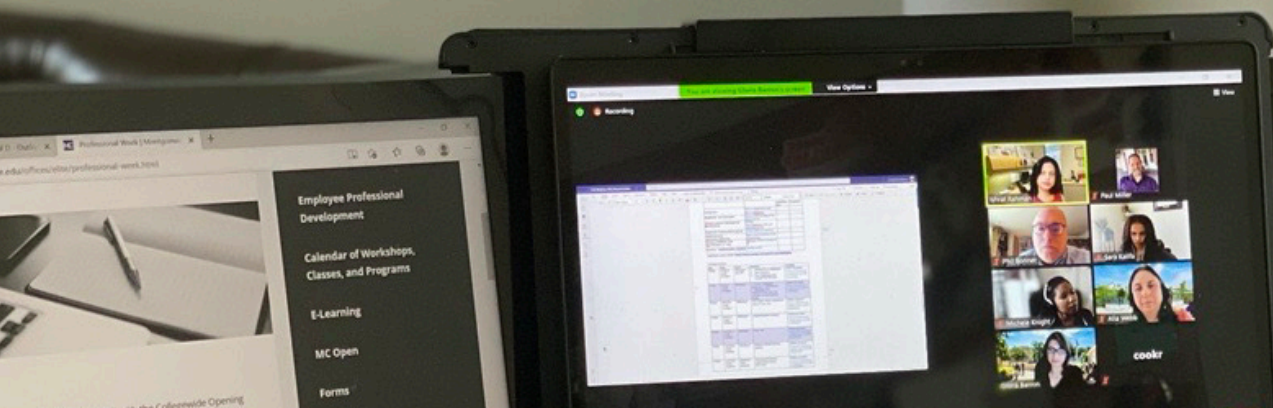
Each year, the Love of Teaching Conference features a central theme. This year's theme is storytelling and how educators across all disciplines can use it as a powerful tool in the classroom.

About Our Keynote Speaker: Matthew Decker, Associate Professor, English & Smithsonian Faculty Fellowship Co-Coordinator



Professor Matthew Decker is a passionate educator, faculty leader, and innovator in digital storytelling. For more than a decade, he has shaped transformative learning experiences for students and colleagues at Montgomery College's Takoma Park/Silver Spring campus, where he serves as an Associate Professor of English.

A strong advocate for professional development, Professor Decker has coauthored award-winning grants, designed collegewide programs, and facilitated high-impact workshops through his work with ELITE and the Academy for Teaching Transformation. He co-founded the Digital Storytelling Internship, which has received two Innovation Grants. Through this initiative, he has helped mentor more than 30 interns and earned international recognition as a scholar and practitioner in the field.

His leadership also includes his role in the Smithsonian Faculty Fellowship, where he supports faculty in integrating museum resources into their curriculum through museum visit pedagogy and even virtual resources, such as the Smithsonian Learning Lab. Professor Decker holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from St. Mary's College of Maryland and a Master of Arts from American University.

In his keynote for the 2025 Love of Teaching Conference, Professor Decker will examine the transformative potential of storytelling as a tool for connection, creativity, and inclusive pedagogy. With storytelling as the unifying thread of his work, he continues to inspire educators to foster deeper engagement and elevate diverse voices in the learning environment.

Discussion - Breakout 1

Theme: Engagement

Consider one of your courses where students often find concepts difficult because of the material's complexity, abstract ideas, or difficulty connecting the topic to their lives. These challenges may have led to low engagement, limited participation, or reduced performance.

Based on today's keynote and group discussion, reflect with your group on how storytelling could be used to support deeper understanding, increase student motivation, and make the material more accessible.

Group Discussion Prompts:

1. Jot down a list of approximately three difficult concepts from the course. Narrow to one you would like to address today.
2. Using the Student-Teacher, Multiple Means, or other Universal Design-inspired idea from today's keynote, brainstorm a new approach to helping your students unpack this concept.
3. Consider how you might guide or encourage your students to take the lead in exploring the concept and sharing their learning with you or their peers.

Our mission is to cultivate a culture of inclusion and accessibility at MC. Through training, consultations, and an online knowledge base all centered on Universal Design principles, we help promote individual empowerment and social justice as well as regulatory and ethical compliance.

We developed a research-based model for promoting accessibility that integrates best practices in three main areas:



Universal Design (UD)

Guidelines for ensuring that all physical spaces are created or retrofitted to be accessible and usable by everyone, regardless of ability



Universal Design for Learning (UDL)

An educational framework that provides flexible teaching methods to accommodate diverse learning styles



Digital Accessibility

Strategies to ensure that online content, tools, and resources are designed and optimized to be usable by everyone.
