Treat All Blood and Body Fluid as if They Were Infected With:

- HIV (Human Immunodeficiency Virus) Which Frequently Leads to AIDS.
- 2) HBV (HEPATITIS B Virus).
- Other Bloodborne Pathogens (Microorganisms Found in Human Blood Which Can Cause Disase).

KNOW Procedures, Practices, Vaccination Requirements, and Appropriate Reporting for Incidents of Exposure.

KNOW Color Codings:

- Labels and Signs are Fluorescent Orange-Red with the Lettering or Symbol in a Contrasting Color.
- 2) Red Bags or Containers
 Don't Have to Be Labeled
 Since Their Red Color
 Indicates They May Contain
 Biohazards.

READ All Signs and Labels Carefully.

Protective Equipment and Contaminated Laundry Properly in Designated Areas.




