How long have you worked at Montgomery College, and what is your current role and department?

I have worked at Montgomery College for 2 years and 8 months. I am a learning skills support specialist in the Health Sciences Department at the Takoma Park, Silver Spring campus.

How long have you been in your current profession?

My profession is being an educator. I started teaching elementary school in 1988 (taught 3rd,

4th, and 5th grade all subjects, K-6 mathematics, k-6 nutrition) until June 1995 in Harlem, New York. During that summer of 1995, I relocated to Maryland and taught 4th and 5th grade all subjects, and 6th grade English (junior high school) for 3 years (until 1998). During the spring of 1998, I started working as an academic advisor for 16 years at Coppin State University where part of my duties was to teach a freshman seminar orientation to college course. In addition, by 2008, as an adjunct professor, I started teaching evening courses in psychology (general psychology, and three other upper division psychology courses) until 2018. I began my tenure here at Montgomery College as a learning skills support specialist in January 2019. My duties entail teaching, guiding, facilitating and assisting students with college academic skills so they can be successful in their health sciences programs. Therefore, I have been in my current profession for 33 years and counting.

Who inspires you?

My mother, who died 34 years ago, is my biggest inspiration. From my vision and memory of her, she was quite a sensation. Ever since I was at least 4 years old, my mother instilled the importance of education. She always told her children that "knowledge is power, the power that no one can take from you so make sure you get an education – be intelligent". My mother was a strong, determined individual who spoke up for herself and her family because we were poor. My mother was one of the original community activists who helped shaped and formed what is now District 5 in Central Harlem, New York City. She was a hard-working woman who worked two or three jobs

to keep a roof over our heads and food on the table. Most of all, she was protective and always expressed concern, attention and equal love for all of her children. My three sons are also my inspiration. As a single parent giving birth to twins with special needs, I instilled the importance of respect, education, consistency, determination and productivity. Today, I am proud to say that my sons are all adults and doing very well. Every single day, they inspire me to continue to conquer my endeavors.

Lastly, the students at Montgomery College inspires me. When I assist the students, my goal is to help make a difference in their lives, possibly be an inspiration to them. In addition, I am passionate and inspired to give assistance, guidance, and ensure that they know that I am here for the betterment of their education. Helping students achieve academic success greatly inspires me.

What is your favorite thing about working at MC?

I have been working since 1973. However, throughout my work experience, I have never worked at a place like Montgomery College and this is a huge compliment.
